The winner, NABJ member Brent Solomon of Albany, Ga., works as a reporter for WALB-TV, an NBC affiliate television station in Albany. He performed his original work, "Corporate Brotha" to capture the first place prize of \$3,000.

An independent panel of judges selected the winners based upon each contestant's originality, presentation and overall stage presence.

The "Spirit in the Words" poetry program has been offered at diverse journalism conferences throughout the U.S. including UNITY, the National Association of Black Journalists, the National Association of Hispanic Journalists, the Asian American Journalists Association and the Native American Journalists Association. The poetry program invites participants to write, read and perform their works, in an effort to further the art of poetry.
